Corona Report From Denmark

September 2021— All Coronavirus restrictions are dropped, because over 71 percent of Danes have been fully vaccinated. There will still be masks used at airports and on airplanes. Twelve Danes a week are dying of Corona. The EU has just recommended placing restrictions again on travel from the USA, because Corona hospital admissions are too high. Denmark will have to decide what restrictions it will place on travellers from the USA.

The Danish government has shut down the large vaccine centers, because now there are many fewer people getting vaccinated. People with weak immune systems are now

How to Make the Future Positive

In the last issue I told you about the excitement of paying off the mortgage and looking at a positive future. However, it won't be unless we put away a savings, just like you do for yourself. You can help make this happen!

We aim to be a successful non-profit organization for a long time. How does this happen? There are several ways. One is to not overspend, another is to not borrow, and another is to save for the future. You can be a big help in this process.

Programs must be run with a purpose, to help promote Danish-ness and Denmark's contributions to the betterment of the world or to celebrate an event. It is not just for us to have a fun event for ourselves, but to teach others about hygge, and how Denmark contributes to the world's betterment. You might say that is a tall order. But many years ago, when I was a private School Headmaster, I had a group of busy boys sent to my office due to their mischievous behavior. I was talking to them about their role here on earth. I told them that they were not put here on earth just to fill up space, but to make it a better place when they leave than it was when they came. One of the boys said to me that that was a big job. I agreed with him but told him that was our duty.

How can you help make this a better place for our descendants? It isn't so hard. You may have an old paid-up life insurance policy sitting around that you really don't need for yourself or your family anymore. You can simply change the beneficiary to be the NWDA. You can't take it with you!

Another way is to add a codicil to your will stating that a specific dollar amount be left to the NWDA. Or you can say that a certain percentage of the residual in your estate be left to NWDA. There are many ways to ensure that your family is taken care of and that you also can help a non-profit for a long time with a gift. NWDA is a legal non-profit section 501(c)(3), which can accept donations.

Making such a gift in your will costs you nothing during your lifetime but is a powerful commitment to our work and mission for generations. We have a member with knowledge about this kind of gift. Let me know if you want his number, or you can contact your lawyer.

This year, October 18th to 24th is National Estate Planning Awareness week. Now is a good time to update your will. When you put NWDA in your will, we would love it if you let us know so we can properly thank you in advance.

DACR 2021: A Virtual Success




Image: A screenshot of some of the 2021 DACR attendees on Zoom

Due to the persisting COVID-19 pandemic, the 43rd Danish American Cultural Retreat (DACR) was held online this fall. Equipped with lessons learned from last year's first virtual conference, the NWDA was ready to host another successful retreat. The conference was held over three days, from Friday, September 17th to Sunday the 19th. Like last year, the conference used Zoom video conferencing and YouTube to share lectures and documentaries.

DACR has been a Pacific Northwest tradition since 1978, where it has been held annually at the Menucha Retreat and Conference Center in Corbett, Oregon, on the Washington-Oregon border. DACR offers an opportunity to enrich vour knowledge about Denmark, its significance on the global stage, and important connections between Denmark and the United Statesboth presently and historically.

This year's program began on Friday

with a welcome message presented by NWDA board member Sonja Kromann and NWDA president Edith Christensen. Then, awardwinning author Bill Arnott took the stage, joining from his home in Vancouver, B.C., Canada. He recounted his travels following Viking voyages across the Americas, Europe, Asia, and Oceania. You can find more about his adventure in his newest book *Gone Viking II: Beyond Boundaries*.

Later in the day, attendees gathered for a lively discussion following a showing of the documentary *Egtved Pigen*. The film imagines the story of the Egtved Girl, whose burial remains date back to the Bronze Age. Discovered in 1921 by a Danish farmer, her coffin contained some of the most well-preserved items of Nordic prehistory, including a woolen skirt, a belt, a comb, jewelry, and a hair net. The documentary is available to rent

online from Amazon Video or Curiosity Stream.

On Saturday, day two of DACR started bright and early with a fascinating talk given by Sterre Klaver, a maritime archaeologist working in Denmark. prehistory, to the Vikings, to modern industrial fishing, Denmark is a nation that has been dominated by seafarers. Klaver illustrated Denmark's rich maritime history and discussed exciting new technologies will help that maritime archaeologists dive deeper into Denmark's prolific past.

Next up, Diya Nagaraj logged on from the Museum of Danish America in Iowa with wedding bells ringing. Danish and Danish-American wedding traditions were discussed and Nagaraj showed photos of old wedding gowns from different time periods and social ranks. Not many were white, as is common today.

Award-winning producer and writer Marcia Franklin and Smithsonian Anthropologist Joanna Scherer took the audience all the way back to Pocatello, Idaho in 1895 in their captivating lecture.

Benedicte Wrensted was a Danish photographer who captured photographs of Shoshone-Bannock tribal members. Franklin and Scherer discussed the photographer's life, her work, and her images' impact on its Native American subjects. You can learn more about Benedicte Wrensted and another portrait photographer, Jane Gay, in the Idaho Public Television documentary *Out of the Shadows*.

National Danish Book Club & Literary Event Series



New National Danish Book Club and Literary Event Series Launched

A new nationwide Danish book club and literary event series kicked off during the month of September. Each month, a book by a popular author in Denmark is selected for a virtual group discussion and an accompanying literary event. The literary event is in the format of an author interview or a talk with an expert in the content.

In September, the book of choice was *This Should Be Written in the Present Tense* by contemporary Danish author, Helle Helle. From the two events centered on the book, the capacity of the series to unveil deeper understandings of the content


quickly became evident. This Should Be Written in The Present Tense is a seemingly simple story, which stands true for Helle Helle's other books. A surface level read misses the intricacies held between the lines, where a deceivingly small sentence has the potential to hold heavy meaning for the plot.


This first book club discussion took place on September 14th and was expertly moderated by discussion leader, Nete Schmidt, a Faculty Associate in the Scandinavian Studies Unit in the Department of German, Nordic, and Slavic (GNS) at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Registrations for this first meeting drew engaged readers from Canada and from locations across the U.S., such as New York, Colorado, California, and Washington.

One week later, the literary event on Helle Helle's book featured a dynamic conversation between Claus Elholm Andersen, Ph.D., who is the Paul and Renate Madsen Assistant Professor of Scandinavian Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and literary event facilitator Désirée Ohrbeck, who is a former Danish lecturer at the University of Washington in Seattle. The recording is available on YouTube via the Museum of Danish America channel. The literary event, combined with the book club discussion, allowed readers to uncover and dissect multiple perspectives of the contents of the same book.

The series is the result of an eclectic collaboration between Danish and Nordic organizations across the U.S.

International Coastal Clean-Up

Here in the Pacific Northwest we have long been concerned with environmental sustainability and climate mitigation, as both individual citizens, and from policy perspectives. In that way, we are very much aligned with Denmark and Danish environmental values. Both Denmark and Washington state have public and government support for maintaining clean water, recycling, greener methods of transportation, and green energy.

Denmark is known for its windmills; the Pacific Northwest uses mostly hydroelectric power. We are both working on embracing green alternatives such as solar and biofuel. However, if you are like me, you have been feeling a little anxious about climate change and environmental problems, and have been looking for ways to get involved and help in whatever way you can. With problems this big, it can seem overwhelming. But the solution is to join with others and do something, however small.

On September 11th, ten of us met at Richmond Beach Saltwater Park to participate in an International Coastal Clean-up. We were provided with supplies by Puget Sound Keeper, a local organization that is dedicated to keeping our beaches

and waterways clean. (Please check them out if you have an interest in volunteering—they do great work!). The beach was full of families and others enjoying the sunny day, and many were happy to see us. Children offered up pieces of trash they had found, and adults thanked us for our efforts.

Eli, Sari and their two daughters worked as a team. Adrian and Boris found all sorts of interesting refuse, including a small plastic turtle! Becky, Kristen, Holly, and I meandered near each other, but looked in different areas. We found lots of glass, some old metals, and a book that had been torn up and burnt! Of course, pieces of plastic from packaging or toys was the thing we found the most. After we'd all gone up and down the beach, we reconvened in the parking lot and measured and counted our trash so we could report it toward the total of the International Coastal Clean-up. Then we celebrated with doughnuts and got to know each other a bit, before we all headed our separate ways.

Thank you to each person who came and contributed to the effort. It might be only a small way to improve our environment, but it was ten times what one person would have accomplished. Think of what we might do next time!

Another Way of Viewing Animals

Denmark's industrial animal farms are very productive. If one just looks at pig production, the results are such that almost half of Denmark's agricultural exports are pig meat. This dependence on raising animals for money has a high cost for the millions of animal lives cut short to be products in supermarkets. As part of EU law on animal welfare and Article 13 of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union, animals are recognised as sentient beings, that feel and are intelligent. This starts to give some rights to the animals themselves not just to the owners of animals.

On the island of Funen (Fyn), there is a very different farm in the little town of Hesselager, 40 kilometers from Odense. Dyrenes Frie Farm is an animal sanctuary. All the animals on the farm live a good, long life. They have over forty animals including chickens, pigs, horses, goats, donkeys, and geese. These animals have been rescued from the animal and food industries. But the farm can reduce animal suffering in another way. The farm can educate the public and try to get Denmark away from its dependence on the animal industry, thus cutting down on the number of animals being produced. The farm is open to the public a few times a year where people can see a different way of being with animals than just consuming them as products (the farm has its own website and is on Facebook). It can be an eye-opener when Camilla Kærslund and Kirsten van Deurs explain how

In Denmark, the Julemand arrives on a boat from Greenland.

This was something I had to see, even if I was not the Julemand's usual demographic. My roommate came with me, which was fun and odd—she was from Germany and a bit jaded, so I wouldn't have thought seeing "Santa" was something she was interested in. But I suppose seeing this incarnation of him was different from her Weihnachtsmann, too.

We rode our bikes to the harbor and followed the crowds of families and children to the water's edge. Both being short in stature, we climbed up some stairs to overlook a railing and get out of the way of the excited children crowding the lip of the harbor, and the band waiting to play Christmas music. It was a very cold night. Even muffled up in my down

coat, wearing wool socks and boots, my toes never quite warmed up, and my roommate and I huddled together for warmth. We promised ourselves some gløgg in the Torv afterward and waited.

Finally, off in the darkness west of the harbor, we could see a boat coming toward us. It was the only one around—a large yacht—and as it got closer, we could see that it was absolutely covered in ice and snow, as well as twinkling julbelysning.

The Julemand and his *nisser* waved as they came closer, and the children cheered as it coasted to a stop at the harbor's edge. Several of the Julemand's *nisser* helped tie the boat up, and put out the ramp. With his sack, the Julemand came down into the waiting crowd of children, as their parents stood back. With

the help of the nisser, he began pulling presents from his bag and passing them out to the children, who though visibly excited, were very polite in waiting, asking questions that I couldn't hear, and looking very happy to be meeting the Julemand himself.

My roommate and I came down from our perch at this point, because even though we were definitely too old to get handed a present, or to ride the juletog up the hill, we still wanted a closer look at the man himself and his boat. He looked just like the Santas I'd seen my whole life, and whoever played the role this year twinkled appropriately, smiling through his beard and leaning down to hear questions from the children. I still don't know how they got so much ice on that boat, but I loved the commitment!

We followed the juletog up to the square, got our (completely necessary for our frozen extremities) gløgg and æbleskiver. The whole Torv had been transformed into an ice skating rink and that's where the band, the juletog, and the Julemand arrived to continue the festivities.

Christmas time in Denmark was one of my favorite experiences, and judging by the attendance of the Julemarkeder, I am far from alone in this. It is a wonderful way to make the winter a little less dark and cold. Part of what makes Denmark's celebration special is, I think, that both the children and the adults celebrate it with abandon—no irony, just hygge!

On Sunday, Diya Nagaraj took the stage again to kick off the last day of DACR 2021. She shared the innovative history surrounding Danish porcelain manufacturing and design from 1885 to 1920. Bing & Grøndahl and Royal Copenhagen especially were two coveted companies during that peak period and are still around today! Then, it was Dave Nordin's turn to talk about Vikings. Nordin gave riveting presentations about the wide reach of the Norse language across the world and the history of the Gokstad Viking replica ship, which traveled around the globe in 1893 from Chicago to Geneva.

From photographs taken in 19th-century Idaho to the Nordic Bronze Age, abundant opportunities to explore Danish and Danish American culture were available this year.
