Moving to another country and trying to find my place in a culture I hadn't grown up with required a lot of growing on my part. I was afraid to move to Denmark, I really was. When I was younger the last thing I wanted to do was build my future here. My 14-year-old mind palace was furnished with worries about how hard it would be to start from scratch. And it was hard, but not in a negative way. Since moving, I have been challenged to develop my skills in a new language, take up winter bathing, and foster connections with different communities I had never encountered before.

Although all this newness was at times intimidating, I've realized through my time here that I can't really beat fear, that it will always be a part of my life in one form or another. So I resolved to do it scared, to take the uncertain step. Not in spite of my anxious hesitations, but with them. Together my fear and I walked hand in hand through many unknown doors, afraid but ready.

And I'm grateful I accepted the challenges and uncomfortable emotions that came with living 4,696 miles away. Because they helped me have a sense of trust in myself and my abilities. A trust I never thought I could have. But now I'm able to look back at all that fear and find myself unscathed. I now navigate through the world with faith in myself and have curiosity for scary things.

For the rest of my life, I'm sure I will visit Askov again and again, both physically and mentally. The lessons I've learned will follow me and I have many højskole friends I hope to keep in my life. I'm certain memory will also often tap its phantom finger on

Godt Nytår! We attempted a return to in person Jul events this year at NWDA. Our pre-pandemic Christmas season typically has had the Circles' Bazaar, Christmas Fest, Julestue, and Lillejuleaften.

We knew early on that the Bazaar could not go on and planned for the third year of the online Juleauktion. We had an unprecedented amount of donations from individuals and local businesses. This was thanks in part to Reina reaching out to so many businesses and making it easier for those who wanted to donate to complete an online form with information. We had more than 350 items as part of the auction and raised over \$11,000 to support NWDA and its programs.

We anticipate having year four of the Juleauktion in November 2023 and accept donations all year long. So, if you have any Danish items, especially Christmas items, that no longer have a place in your home, contact us and

bring them by the Seattle office to start our 2023 auction item collection.

Since we are attempting a gradual return of in person events, and had the Annual Membership Meeting and Dinner later than normal this year, we could not hold a Danish Christmas Fest, but we did plan for Julestue to be held at Harmony Hall again. After two years of "At-Home" Julestue and sending out paper craft kits, it was nice to have people gather for this event.

While it was a smaller group than the few years just prior to COVID changing the way we gather, those who attended enjoyed seeing each other and celebrating Christmas the Danish way as a group. There were flettede julehjerter (woven hearts) made, even a few more difficult ones, and flettede stjerner (woven stars) attempted, because they are quite tricky until you get lots of practice.

We danced and sang around the Christmas tree to Danish and English favorites like Højt fra træets grønne top, Frosty the Snowman, and Nu' det jul igen. Our tradition of a real Christmas tree, donated by Pfaff's Old Time Tree Farm in Auburn, lived on in Harmony Hall. It was wonderful to see, and smell, the tree that reached the ceiling and filled the middle of the dance floor once again.

As the dancing ended, we had a visit from Julemanden! He visited and took pictures with all of the children,

Danish American Cultural Retreat (DACR), Himmelbjerget and Dane Camp (though both got to be in person again in 2022!), and the Juleauktion. Also, how we have been able to have select events in person over the last year, like the Queen's Birthday and Fredagscafe.

I had an ask of the membership that attended that day, and I will ask it here too: If you have any ideas or requests for events or programs (especially if you can assist in getting it off the ground by volunteering), please contact me. We are about to be 100 years old next August, and we want to continue into the next 100 with programs that encourage growth and participation of our membership and further our mission to share Danish culture, traditions, and values with the wider community.

After the meeting concluded a portion of the attendees stayed to mingle and have dinner. Chef Jørn Mathiasen again wowed us with a fabulous meal. Since he never disappoints, he is given free rein to design a meal that will tempt most Danes. This time he settled on a traditional duck dinner, a cold cauliflower shared starter, and risalamande with cherry sauce to finish. It was lovely to have a marvel-

Across the King's Garden from Odense's Train Station in the center of the city is Odense Castle. Normally castles in Denmark have a historical link to nobility or the royal family. Odense Castle first was built as a hospital in 1280 by the Order of St. John (later called Skt. Hans Monastery). The order has been around since 1099 and still exists today. Their existence grew out of the Crusades. Their goal is to help the sick and the poor. Skt. Hans Church which was also founded by the Order of St. John is attached to the castle. When the Swedes took over Odense, they broke all the furniture down to kindling for the castle's fireplaces.

After the Lutheran Reformation, the castle became owned by the king. After some remodeling, it was used by nobility. Just before Denmark received its constitution in 1849, the crown prince lived in the castle as Funen's first governor. When author Hans Christian Andersen was born in Odense in 1805, the infant mortality was so high that he was baptized right away without going to a church, but officially his baptism was approved at Skt. Hans Church. H.C. Andersen's mother washed clothes at the castle until she died in the

Gråbrødre Hospital after deteriorating as an alcoholic in the poorhouse. H.C. Andersen often played with the other children at the castle including the future Frederik VII.

In Odense's history only two people have been called honorary citizens of Odense: King Frederik VII and Hans Christian Andersen. Because of the vast amount of time that Prince and King Frederik spent living in Copenhagen and Odense, Odense started to be called Little Copenhagen. Most of the past 500 years, the castle has been used in various governmental administrative capacities.

The king had a mistress Countess Danner that for awhile lived in the castle with the crown princess. Later Countess Danner left her worldly possessions on her death to found a foundation for poor working women. Today the Danner Shelter empowers women in the spirit of modern feminism.

Notice in the included picture, the castle flies with the Ukrainian flag as a show of support. Skt Hans Church's red brick is to the left and the bronze statue of Frederik VII harkens back to when young Andersen had a royal playmate in his childhood. The statue stands directly under the flagpole.

Zooming into Christmas: Lillejuleaften on Zoom

On December 23rd 2022, the NWDA community gathered to celebrate "Lillejuleaften," or "Little Christmas Eve," together for the first time on Zoom. After no services were held in 2020, the Portland Lillejuleaften service had resumed in 2021. Portland and Seattle had each planned inperson services for 2022, however both were cancelled due to icy weather conditions in the Pacific Northwest. Nearly 40 people logged into Zoom, but the total number watching was larger as several individuals may have watched from a single account.

Traditionally, the pastor from the Danish Lutheran Church of Vancouver, B.C., travels to Seattle to preach and lead the church service in Danish. This year we were happy to "meet" the newly installed Pastor Carsten Mølgaard Hansen over Zoom. Pastor Carsten led the prayers, scripture readings, and gave the sermon.

We missed singing hymns together which was not possible on the Zoom platform but enjoyed recordings of the DR Girls' Choir (DR Pigekoret) with "Det kimer nu til julefest" and "Dejlig er Jorden". Although we could not have "julekage" virtually, Christmas greetings were shared by friends near and far.

The sermon brought a message of how Christmas is about love and the significance of repetition of Christmas traditions in celebrating Christmas. Pastor Carsten also shared the story of an instinctive act of kindness given by a stranger that helped his sister to travel home for Christmas when this seemed potentially impossible.

Several people requested a translation of the sermon, which Pastor Carsten graciously provided. A quote from the end of the sermon is provided below in Danish and in English. The full text of the original Danish sermon and an English translation are available. If you would like an elec-



the inside of my head and let me relive a home that is no longer alive.

Like now, when I go in the water, I'll remember what it was like to winter bath with my Askov friends. The evenings we stood perched on the dock watching jellyfish swaying like small boats. How the water made fish's scaly skin look soft. Looking up at the moon that hung over us like a full, bright halo. How the stars rested above and below us, the sky gleaming with tiny globs of sun and the fjord floor covered in a galaxy of starfish. The many times we yelled and smiled and laughed as the ocean gave us a cold hug.

My most comforting takeaway is that it's alright to never really feel like an "adult." Since moving to Denmark, I've talked with family members, teachers, friends, and I've gathered that very few people really feel like adults. Maybe it's because growing up doesn't feel like how we expected as kids— it certainly is that way for me. The only time I've really felt like an adult was when I was truly excited over a pair of socks I got for Christmas.

Maybe It's also because of the disconnect we have between how we view ourselves and how others view us. In retrospect, many situations at Højskole called for a confidence and care I definitely did not have in high school. In that sense, I can see how I have become adultish. It honestly seems like being an adult is less of an innate identity and more of an accumulation of actions you choose to make everyday. Some days I'm better at adulting than others, but I'm learning, whether it be in navigating through højskole or setting up the practical stuff— and that counts for a lot.

However, I couldn't have transitioned without the help of my family. Whether it was a home to stay at or a ride to some place, my aunts, uncle, and cousins provided support I will always be grateful for. Truly. They have given me the gift of their time and I hope to not take that for granted. They have been more than a piece of driftwood in a choking sea of change, they have been a lifeboat that has saved me from sinking.

Five months into my stay in Denmark and finding myself in a new year, I'm proud to say I laugh a big woman's laugh, rough and rich and sometimes a bit too loud. But I like to wear this laugh, because it's my own, because it's taken a long time to let my voice take up space.

My last piece of knowledge I've picked up along the way is a Danish phrase I've heard several times over. It is simple and blunt, and that's what I love about it. So to anyone reading this, I assure you, det skal nok gå.

and another for support for Education.

The Danish Association was created nearly 100 years ago to take care of the later years of retirees. As people lived longer, the Danish Home became a nursing home and less of a home for aging Danes. So the NWDA decided to sell the old home in south Seattle and buy a gathering place instead. It would be for elders and others with a similar purpose of fellowship and programs for all ages to enjoy and learn about the Danish culture and the positive impact of Danes on the environment and other people. It would be a place for hygge.

Some years ago a kind member left a legacy gift for an Endowment for Elders in the Seattle area. Because of this gift we have programs like Torsdagsklubben, a once-a-month meal at noon and a program. We also are able to furnish wheel chairs, walkers, and canes, as well as other help needs like a call button to wear, special hearing phones, personal contacts, etc.

for our elders.

We also have another endowment in which the income helps people with scholarships for their education or retraining. This was created by the donations in legacies by two other members. They made a gift which helps many with their education and retraining for a better life.

These wonderful gifts have made it possible to help our elders and our young. When you are planning and deciding what you want to leave as a legacy, think of the NWDA and how you can help it for a long time into the future. It is so easy to do with a few words in your will. Just talk to your attorney as they are well versed in these types of legacy plans. Perhaps together we can create a Hundred Year Endowment for the future of NWDA to continue another hundred years.
