Celebrating 100 Years of NWDA

One hundred years old. Now in the broader context of time, that may not be all that long. Especially if you think about history and longevity in Europe, and Denmark in particular. The Danish flag alone has an 800-year history. However, things are "newer, younger" in the United States and we live in a time where things are ever more fleeting and even disposable. So truly, one hundred years is a major milestone.

The world is constantly changing, and all organizations and businesses must adjust or become obsolete. The Northwest Danish Association has not always been as it is today. In the future it won't be what it is now either. Change happens. Change must happen.

In August 1923 the Northwest Danish Old Peoples Home was founded. It was created to fill a need that the greater Danish community in the region saw as something they could do something about. Danes that had immigrated to the Pacific Northwest in the late 1800s and early 1900s were starting to age and didn't have the extended families who could help care for them that they may have had back in Denmark. At home services, like many we have now, didn't exist and these Danes wanted to live through their retirement in a place they could be surrounded by people who spoke their Danish language and appreciated their Danish culture.



The Home became one of the meeting grounds for the Danish community of the greater-Seattle area and the Pacific Northwest for decades. It was rebuilt and changed with the times as care home regulations were updated. Until the time there were no Danes left in the Danish Home. The need had changed. Danes wanted to stay in their homes longer, but still needed services and the Danish community still needed a meeting place. So, in the 1980s, after about 60 years of the Danish Old People's Home, it was time for a big change. The office building in North Seattle was purchased, some renovations made, and a new home for the Danish Community was created.

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


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Celebrating 100 Years of NWDA

- Many more events (that you can read about later in this newsletter) throughout this Spring, Summer, and Fall!



Everyone had so much fun celebrating together, and who doesn't like an excuse to dress up in fun costumes and drink hot cocoa!







Church Towns and Crocodiles

In the northern part of the island of Falster is a little town called Eskilstrup. The name Eskilstrup from the masculine navn Eskil or Eskild plus the word torp. A torp is a town that usually was created during the age of the vikings. The original "adelby" or mother settlement allowed a torp to be created nearby as an outlying settlement. If the adelby thought that the torp was not benefitting the adelby, the adelby had the right to force the trop to be abandoned.

On the island of Zealand, there is a town called Kirke Eskilstrup, which

means Church Eskilstrup and there is actually a church there called Kirke Eskilstrup Kirke meaning Church Eskilstrup Church. But I actually visited Eskilstrup Church on Falster. That church was built around 1130. It is painted red, which is a tradition for churches in Gulborgsund Kommune. The church has the oldest frescoes in Denmark from about 1275. The pulpit is from 1639. It is unusual to see that on the church tower, there is a large working clock that can be read from quite a distance.

The town of Eskilstrup had about 10 houses and farms in 1682. A hundred

years later, a train station was built just east of the edge of town. This led to many more houses being built east and south of the church. Just before 1900, it now had a couple of schools, an assembly hall, an inn, a telephone/telegraph station and a medical doctor living there. In the past hundred years the population has doubled to about 1000 people.

Some things, one can enjoy within five kilometers of Eskilstrup, are Torkilstrup Windmill built in 1743 for milling grain, Denmark's Tractor Museum, Falster Golf Club and the Crocodile Zoo. The zoo is the world's largest, having over 150 crocodiles. The zoo is working with the Venezuelan government to protect the Orinoco crocodile from extinction in the wild by releasing 200 a year in the South American country. This crocodile can reach up to 13 feet in length and only lives on the Orinoco River which also is in Columbia. It is legally protected there, but it is difficult because of poaching. When not being killed, they can live as long as humans. The zoo is also helping endangered crocodiles in Cuba.

OREGON NWDA RECENT ACTIVITIES

We moved again! The Oregon NWDA is trying - once again - to adjust to a new meeting place. Now we meet at Nordia House, a beautiful building in Portland that we enjoy very much, but it is difficult to get along without all the books, storage space, and ability to schedule our events and activities freely without having to share the space with four other Nordic groups. Needless to say, it means that we have had to cut down on our activities, but it has also given us new ideas and possibilities, such as the following new event:

In February we launched a new venture, which is proving to be very successful: A Danish Conversation Group, which meets twice a month, on the second Monday at 12:30 - 2:00 pm, and the fourth Monday at 7:00 - 8:30 pm. In this way, it is possible for those who don't drive in the evening to meet in the afternoon, and those who work day time jobs to meet in the evening. For the first two meetings we had 11 participants each time - not all the same 11 - and everyone had a great time. Most of them know some Danish, but we had all levels from beginners to native speakers. There is no pressure to speak, but all have a chance to participate at their level, and only if they indicate that they want to be corrected, do we comment on their grammar or vocabulary. It was great to hear that everyone encourages those who struggle to find the right

words, and no one is critical. We all had many good laughs, and the time went really fast.

Each meeting has a conversation topic, and the first time it was "Danish Food", which is easy to discuss. Everyone knows a lot of Danish food and has likes and dislikes. The second time it will be "Family", including emigration of family members. We plan to continue these groups as long as there is interest, and we may divide up the groups part of the time, if their knowledge of Danish makes it necessary. However, adding "Zoom" participation is probably not advisable, because it might cut down on the spontaneity of the members, especially those who are not fluent speakers.

Are there any of our members who don't enjoy smørrebrød? Probably not, so every year we start with a big smørrebrød "DAVS" Nytårsfro-

kost. It is an old tradition here, and DAVS stands for "Danish-American Vintage Society". It is probably the most popular and well attended event each year. Each person brings five slices of Danish smørrebrød, most on Danish rugbrød and using the typical ingredients, such as herring, leverpostej, roast beef, ham, shrimp, salmon, frikadeller, cheese etc. The smørrebrød is decorated with suitable toppings and enjoyed with the usual Danish drinks, such as beer and aquavit. We line up the food in proper order, first seafood, then meats, and finally cheese and/or fruit salad. (See illustration). As usual, we started the year with this feast, and the great room in Nordia House

turned out to be a perfect place to have it.

GLØGG

Hanne Wagner and Kaja Voldbæk are specialists in that department! Again last fall they made a delicious gløgg, served lots of "Saltemad", i.e. various meats, leverpostej, and cheeses, and invited all the Danes and friends to gløgg aften. What a lively enjoyable evening with lots of talking, singing, and This event always laughter. takes place in the fall, and it's always very popular.


SANGFEST & DANSK BOOK CLUB

One activity that is perhaps unique for the Oregon NWDA is our "Sangfest". We used to call it "Sangaften", and it was always at our home. Now we meet on Saturday afternoons at Nordia House, so we call it sangfest. Our wonderful musician, Aage Nielsen, no longer lives in Portland, so we have sangaften when he is able to come, usually twice a year. Next time will be on Saturday, May 20th. We sing lots of Danish songs, and of course we drink coffee, accompanied by pastry, usually some Danish pastry or home made cake or cookies.

Another activity that is perhaps unique for the Portland group is the Danish Book Club where we all read Danish novels in the original language and also discuss them in Danish. Of course most of our members are native Danes, but lately we have acquired several active members who have learned Danish as adults, which is really admirable. Five of our current members are not native speakers, but read the novels and participate happily in the discussion. Sometimes it is difficult, but they persevere!

2023 Danish American Cultural Retreat Returns to Menucha

We are excited to have the Danish American Cultural Retreat (DACR) return to the Menucha Retreat and Conference Center this year after three years of meeting virtually. This year's DACR is scheduled for Friday - Sunday, September 8-10. This continues the early fall timing established in 2020 which we have gotten a lot of positive feedback about and eliminates conflicts with Skt. Hans Aften and other midsummer festivities that were an issue when meeting in June.

The Danish American Cultural Retreat (DACR) is a great opportunity to spend a weekend away with friends and family. The Menucha Retreat and Conference Center is located in the beautiful Columbia River Gorge and features a beautiful estate with views east to Chimney Rock and Crowne Point and west to Portland.
