Goodbye Streetcars, Hello Light Rail

Streetcars began appearing around the world in the 1800s, but after World War II, governments invested heavily in highways. As a result, streetcar usage began to decline. Then in the 1970's, the car-centric planning was starting to cause problems for cities.

In Denmark, throughout the rise and fall of streetcars, DSB — the national railway operator — continued to run. Regular trains, or heavy rail, can comfortably carry large numbers of passengers over long distances. Since the 1930s, Copenhagen has also had its S-train system. It's also heavy rail, but optimized for shorter

distances where many commuters stand during the ride.

Traditional streetcars are a form of light rail: smaller vehicles with lower passenger capacity and cheaper infrastructure, since they run in the street with cars. But because they don't have their own right-of-way, they are often slow. Modern light rail systems, however,

use dedicated rights-of-way and higher-capacity vehicles, allowing them to operate safely at much higher speeds.

As of October 2025, the first section of the Greater Copenhagen Light Rail has opened to the public: 13 km from Ishøj to Rødovre. The remaining 15 km, from Rødovre to Lundtofte, will open in the summer of 2026. When complete, the line will run through eight municipalities and include 29 stations. The new route will help relieve pressure on S-Trains and regional trains by allowing passengers to travel around the perimeter of Copenhagen instead of going in and out of the city center.

Danish light rail projects are funded by

the national government as well as by the regions and municipalities the line passes through. Typically, the national government withdraws financial support once the construction phase is complete. In Aarhus, some EU funding was also used.

Lastly, only 0.6 percent of Americans commute by bike, compared to 25 percent of Danes. About 5 percent of Americans use public transportation, while 25 percent of Danes do. And while 80 percent of Americans commute by car, the figure in Denmark is 55 percent.

Johnny Appleseed and the Apple Festival

Johnny Appleseed inspired the American Apple Festivals of the Fall in the United States, but the tradition of celebrating the harvest dates back to 1019 in Scandinavian history.

The Museum of Danish America says the Álfablót (or ancient “Elf Sacrifice”, which I’m hoping was a sacrifice of harvest foods to the elves), is an old Nordic celebration that honors Scandinavian ancestors today by decorating pumpkins and drinking apple cider. Álfablót is also similar to Fastelavn. These celebrations were meant to appease supernatural spirits in pre-Christian Scandinavia, as described in the poem Austrfararvisur (“the account of the travels to the east”), composed around the year 1019. Later, sources disagree about whether this was supposed to forestall disease, celebrate the harvest, divine future fortunes, or something else.

So, it’s not unusual to see the Northwest Danish Association celebrating the Apple Festival in Portland, Oregon, on Novem-

ber 1st.

Hundreds of young people with their children came to taste apples and apple pies. Plus, dozens of people walked away with apple bread, apple cakes, and apple pies they won during the Cake Walk. Plus, we had friendly vendors offering beautiful handmade crafts and holiday gifts for purchase.

This was our 2nd annual Apple Festival, and the attendance grew exponentially. That’s why we’re hoping next year will be even more exciting for our Scandinavian community to look forward to. But, until then, jot down the following dates on your holiday calendar:

Lillejuleaften – December 23, 2025, from 5:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

The Free Viking School – December 30, 2025, from noon to 3:00 p.m.
