Carnival For Kids – Fastelavn 2026

Seattle is in that uncertainty between wintertime and springtime. The weather doesn't know if it wants to leap into spring full force or stay cold and gray. Right at the center of that time is Fastelavn. Fastelavn is a celebration with many customs tied to the coming spring. It helps us look ahead to the flora and fauna waking from winter and have a little fun before the Lenten season.

Fastelavn has been compared to Carnival for kids with its fun costumes and abundance of sweets and games. Our celebration at NWDA is long standing and this year was no different. Families gathered with kids in costumes ready for fun!

Craft time filled the first part of our party. Fastelavnris were decorated with colorful streamers and cut-outs of masks and cats. Rasebosser were decorated with colored paper, stickers, and drawings. Coloring sheets also taught about the history of Fastelavn as they were completed.

Then came the time to hear more of the history and traditions of Fastelavn. Many of the kids in attendance had come in past years and they could help tell about the story and activities. After story time, all the kids gathered their rasebosser and lined up in the hallway to parade in and around the hall with their costumes. They shook their rasebosser and got coins from the adults, making so much noise you could barely hear everyone singing "Fastelavn er mit navn" as we marched.

The parade ended with the kids around the edge of the dance floor ready to hit and break the wooden barrel that was waiting for them, hung from a hook in the center of the ceiling. I was impressed with this group of kids and how well they listened to the safety instructions about staying at the edge of the dance floor, waiting their turn to hit the barrel, and returning the bat to the grown-up in charge. You don't want a kid to be hit with a swinging barrel because they weren't looking toward it!

Even with a younger group, we had some strong kids who didn't need any grown-up help to break the barrel open this year! All the kids got multiple attempts to hit the barrel, and it finally broke on a swing from Noah. *Continued on page 3*

Winter is Thawing into Spring

This morning, I received a WhatsApp message from my son in Denmark stating, "The snow here is pretty much all gone and it is beginning to feel a lot more like spring". This reminded me that at this time of the year we are all looking forward to spring.

In Denmark, January 2026 was recorded as the coldest January in over 20 years with temperatures as low as minus 18.2 degree Celsius (-1.8 Fahrenheit). This is winter weather and temperatures that many of us, with roots in Denmark, only remember from our childhood. My children reside in Denmark, and then they in 40 to 50 years, can also say that they in their youth experienced really cold weather with lots of snow and frozen canals and lakes during the winter season.



NWDA has established a Business Plan Committee consisting of Gary Korsgaard, Erik Laursen, Kim Kasch, Lars Kasch and Preben Pedersen. The plan is to give some deep thought to the future direction of NWDA, which can be presented at the NWDA Annual meeting in Oct 2026.

Business-wise we have had a satisfying 1Q-2026 operation of the MOB (Meridian Office Building) with currently only one vacant office, the smallest office in the building, which means we currently have a tenant occupancy rate of about 95%. Our newest tenant is a non-profit organization known to many of you and one which is worthy of your support, Special Olympics Washington. With only 3 months left of the financial year ending Jun 30, 2026, we forecast a positive and satisfying result for the financial year 2025/2026.

I will in-the-near-future reach out to the Viking Ship people to arrange a Viking Ship event in the spring or early summer 2026.

I look forward to seeing many of you at our events in the spring of 2026.

Worshipping and Brewing in Hellerup

My girlfriend Lise and I went for a walk just north of Copenhagen when we happened upon a church in a quiet area away from busy roads. It was Hellerup Church. Hellerup is part of Gentofte Kommune.

The area of Hellerup got its name from Johan David Heller, who purchased a country retreat in 1748 called Lokkerup, normally used by the wealthy as a place where no farming was done despite all the land. He renamed it Hellerupgård.

Another important name that developed from a man's name to a building name and then to a place name came from Jonas Thue in the 1690s. Thue was a brewmaster who had a tavern called Thuesborg. This estate was later expanded and called Store Tuborg. It was at this estate that N. F. S. Grundtvig lived his last years and died in 1872. In 1875, Tuborg Brewery was founded in Hellerup, but it had no connection to the family of Jonas Thue other than being named after Thue's tavern. Tuborg Brewery was later absorbed into Carlsberg Group. In 1996, the last beer was brewed in Hellerup. Carlsberg later moved production from the Greater Copenhagen area to Fredericia in Jutland. As a result, the large industrial areas in Valby and Hellerup were redeveloped into modern urban districts. This reuse of valuable land strengthened Greater Copenhagen's

urban development. Tuborg has also given its name to several places and roads in Hellerup.

The architect of Hellerup Church was Thorvald Jørgensen, and the church opened to the public in 1900. Jørgensen also designed the current Christiansborg Palace (opened in 1928), where the Danish parliament meets on the island of Slotsholmen. The chancel is the part of the church near the altar reserved for the clergy and the choir. The stained-glass windows of the chancel were created by Johannes Kragh in 1918. They depict the four archangels: Gabriel, Michael, Raphael, and Uriel. Ten years later, Kragh also created a rose window above the main entrance to the church.

Other things to see in Hellerup include Experimentarium (a science museum), Gentofte Fire Museum, Mindelunden in Ryvangen (a memorial for the fallen of the Danish Resistance), and Øregård Art Museum. Famous people who have lived in or grown up in Hellerup include Lars Ulrich (founder of Metallica), author Peter Høeg, football player Michael Laudrup, and members of the A. P. Møller–Maersk family.

A true Pacific Northwest tradition, DACR has been held every year for more than 40 years at the Menucha Retreat and Conference Center overlooking the Columbia River Gorge.

Spend a long weekend, Friday through Sunday, with like-minded people who have a passion for life-long learning and Danish-American topics. Join us **Friday, September 18 through Sunday, September 20, 2026** (or just one day if you can't make the whole weekend) to delve into topics of interest, as well as time in the natural beauty of the Columbia River Gorge and social time with fellow attendees.

Participants sometimes struggle to put into words how the experience of DACR affects them, but it is more than a conference. It is a retreat that is meant to relax as well as stimulate the brain. Eight hours of talks on a variety of topics centers the weekend. Edith (Dee) Corbett was born January 10, 1929 in Slagelse, Denmark, to Oscar Neilsen and Ellen Hansen, and passed away of natural causes on January 6, 2026 at her residence in Shoreline,

Washington. As a young woman of 19, Dee emigrated to the United States, living first in Valparaiso, Indiana, where she worked at a hospital before moving to Winnetka to work as a governess. After a brief return to Denmark, Dee ventured to California where she began working in the insurance industry. Marriage to James F. Cronander followed (1956-1969), along with the birth of her daughter, Cheryl. The family moved to Seattle in 1959 where she lived for the rest of her life. Dee later married Wallace D. Corbett (1992-1997) whom she had met at St. Paul Insurance Company. Dee was a member of the Danish Sisterhood and the Danish Foundation, and kept in close contact with her Danish family, all of whom remained in Denmark. Dee had a great zest for life, a sense of adventure, and great style. She enjoyed cooking, entertaining, and traveling. The arrival of her granddaughter, Katya, in 2002 was one of the great joys of her life. Dee is predeceased by her husbands Jim Cronander and Wally Corbett, sister Ruth Jensen, and brother Kurt Brovil. She is survived by daughter Cheryl Sizov, son-in-law Andrei Sizov, granddaughter Ekaterina Sizov, all of Seattle; and brother Jorn Hansen of Denmark.
